## COURT HOUSE

Business Transacted by the Various Offices at the Court House

### COMMON PLEAS COURT ORDERS TAKEN

Frank E. Andrews, County Treasurer vs. The Defiance Interurban Railway Company, et al., foreclosure, delinquent taxes, finding for plaintiff for taxes and penalty \$30.59. That same is the first lien on land described in pleadings; sale ordered in event of failure to satisfy said lien in ten days; finding that The Defiance Interurban Railway Company has no right, title or interest in or to said described lands and that it is a defunct corporation and further that the said sale title in fee simple to said lands is in the defendant Nicholas Harrmann, subject to the inchoat dower right therein of his wife, the defendant Sarah Harrmann. The County Auditor of this county is directed to make the necessary entries on the records of his office to show the transfer of said title to said defendant Nicholas Harrmann. The clerk of this court is directed to cause so much of this decree as is necessary to show the transfer of the title to said described lands to said Nicholas Harrmann to be recorded in the office of the county recorder of said Paulding county, Ohio.

### PAULDING NOW A MEMBER OF LEAGUE

### NEW LICENSES

Required for Pursuit of Rabbit on First Day of New Year—Old Licenses Not Effective

Hunters who expect to pursue rabbits on the last day of the hunting season, January 1, 1923, must provide themselves with a new hunting license for the coming year. All hunters should give this close attention inasmuch as the Game Protectors have been notified to be especially vigilant on that day in seeking out violators of the license law. The rabbit season closes on January 1. The present hunting licenses were issued for the year 1922, however, and not to cover the open season on rabbits. Therefore, it will be necessary for those who desire to take advantage of the last opportunity of the present season to chase the cottontail to make application for the licenses of the new year, 1923.

### FEDERAL COURT SAVES TRACTION

Judge Killits Vacates Abandonment Order of State, Orders Operation

The Lima-Defiance branch of the Indiana, Columbus & Eastern Traction company will not be abandoned. Federal Judge J. M. Killits, in Toledo, directed the road to continue operation until further order, thus vacating an abandonment permit granted by the Ohio public utilities commission.

The decision was announced after R. R. Trubey, who represented patrons of the line in fighting the abandonment, had presented an argument before the federal court. The public utilities commission ordered that the road should be junked Dec. 31. Judge Killits' ruling saves the line.

"Killits is both a business man and a judge," Trubey said following the decision. "As soon as we showed him conclusively proof that the road was now operating on a profit, he ordered it to continue. I showed him that the city of Defiance, which had granted a franchise right to this railroad, had not been consulted, nor notified, in the discontinuation proceedings."

"I showed him also that whereas the road was suffering big losses in operation three years ago, it showed a deficit of only \$140 in September. At that time sugar beets were not being transported. Large quantities of cattle and stone now are being transported in addition to the beets," Trubey argued.

Trubey declared that there was no doubt the final three months of the year would show a large increase in receipts. Defiance Crescent-News

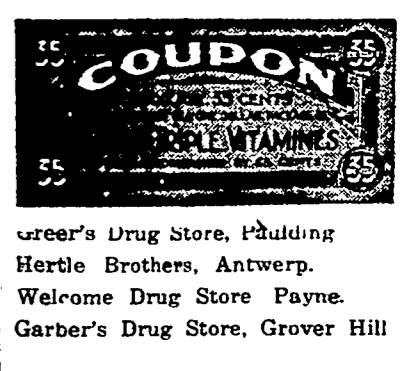
